

The following story was written for us by Becky Terry 43 years ago. We are reprinting this to accompany a large selection of photographs we've collected over the years.



# Belmont Hall Nostalgia & NOVEMBER 1980 PECONIC BAY SHOPPER

The parking lot opposite the Southold Post Office [this refers to the parking lot in the photo below next to a photo where the post office was located] was once an important community center, for on its site stood Belmont Hall, later called Community Hall.

In July 1884, the contract for building a town hall was awarded to Corey & Sturges, the mason work to be done by Moses Cleveland. The owner was J. Henry Cochran. It was a one-story building, 30 by 70 feet, with a seating capacity of 500. A commodious stage at the south end made the hall suitable for public entertainments.

The grand opening was held in October 1884 and a message was read from the Hon. Perry Belmont, Congressman from the 1st Congressional District, who donated the then large sum of \$50 toward the construction, hence the name Belmont Hall. Playbills in the Whitaker files show the wide range of local talent which entertained in the hall ... 1886, a play,

"The Loan of a Lover" by the Universalist Sewing Society; 1888, a concert by the Southold Brass Band; 1889, "Old Fashioned District Skule" by the M.E. Church. In 1893, the Presbyterian Church gave an exhibit of Living Pictures at Belmont Hall, featuring scenes of history, works of art and Bible characters, all for 15¢ admission.

St. Patrick's Dramatic Club presented "The Minister's Sweetheart" with show-stopping lines; Julia Grattan declaring, "I care no more for you than for the barking of a stray dog."; J. Leo Thompson as Judge Lester stating, "God help the woman who has a woman for a judge!"

Perhaps no play given at Belmont Hall was as popular as "the Stolen Will", first performed in 1891, revived in 1902, 1922 and again in 1957, this time at the high school. The original performance netted over \$800 for a new fire signal.

In 1905 the novel projectoscope brought "moving pictures" to Belmont

Hall. Through the years Gilbert & Sullivan operettas, Chataququa lectures and high school graduations were all held at the hall. A newspaper notice of 1920 requests that there be no smoking in Belmont Hall auditorium during high school basketball games. On Feb. 27, 1934, the Southold Fire Dept. Band held its first concert at the hall.

From 1922 until World War II, the Southold Players, later called the Old Town Players, under the direction of Charles Kramer, made an important cultural contribution to the East End. According to Rose Newell, the Players' biggest hit was "Strongheart". A star performer of those years was Harold "Goldie" Goldsmith. Local critics compared his acting in "The Return of Peter Grimm" with the renowned David Warfield. Some said he had the talent of a Barrymore. Bessie Gagen also received rave notices. Playbills from "Brud" Albertson's collection include "the Man From Mexico", "The Squaw Man", "Tons of Money" and three one-act plays given in 1935-36, one of which was written by another starring actress, Miriam Kramer Sivigne. During this period, that hall was enlarged to accommodate a larger stage area.

Many of us recall the summer of 1949, when a stock company came to Southold and created dramatic interest by casting local people in bit parts. One of the actors who brightened the boards of Community Hall was Walter Matthau, now Hollywood famous, but then a beginning performer who rode his bike all over town and kept the company on its toes with his shenanigans. The company also rehearsed some of its plays in the empty Academy building. *[this was a school from 1867 until 1938 and was then vacant until it became the home of Academy Printing in 1948 (celebrating 75 years this year). It has been said that along with Walter Mathau, Jack Warden and Anne Meara also rehersed there.]* 

Community Hall also served as a Youth Center. Under the Park Commission, the hall was renovated in 1945 and Friday night dances were held. Mr. and Mrs. Alan Baker headed the chaperones. At a Valentine Party that year, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Dickerson and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Young supervised. The late "Senator" Ford provided celebrity performances at Community Hall for the benefit of the Fire Department.

From its long history, we can see how involved this modest building became with a wide gamut of organizations and good causes. But as it does to so many buildings, time and decay spelled the end for Community Hall. At a Park District meeting in February, 1954, the vote to raze the hall was unanimous. At the same time, it was voted to tear down the dock at Founders Landing. It was hoped to build another center on the site, but because the American Legion building program was underway, it was decided to support that effort instead.

With its growing population, Southold's community activities now take place in any number of halls and building around town. The role of Belmont Hall as an all-purpose village center has become one more bit of local nostalgia.

#### Old Town Players Hold First Fall Meeting

Thirty-seven members and guests of the Old Town Players held their first meeting of the Fall season at Grange Hall on Thursday evening of last week. This was the largest turnout for a Player's meeting in a long time and the enthusiasm displayed was a good omen for the future activities of the organization.

President Harry Cusack presided at a short business meeting. Mr. Cusack, in his own inimitable way, received the newly elected members into the organization and, in the name of the Players, spoke a few words of welcome to the guests for the evening. Dr. S. B. Fischer, Harold Goldsmith and Harry Cusack were appointed to act as a nominating committee to select a slate of officers to be elected at the October meeting, which will be held the second Monday of that month. The retiring president graciously offered to act as host for that meeting and appointed Mrs. "Brud" Albertson, Mrs. S. B. Fischer and Miss Edna Miller to prepare a program of entertainment.

Director Charles F. Kramer was given a rising vote of thanks for his work in the successful production of the repeat engagement of the Return of Peter Grimm. Mr. Kramer gave a short talk on the future plans of the Players and stated that he intended to start rehearsals on three plays in the near future, to be given next summer.

At the close of the business session several hilarious skits, under the direction of Mr. Kramer, were enjoyed by the gathering. Dramatic ability of the highest order was displayed by several members whose talent had not been brought out before. Games, stunts and dancing made up the balance of the evening. Delightful refreshments were served by the host and hostess for the occasion, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Kramer.

The guests who attended the meeting were Commodore F. H. Robinson, Jr., and his daughter, Mrs. Ernest Mudge, Mrs. Flora Silleck, Miss Beatrice Fleschutz, Miss Elaine Lindenburg and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Williams.







Now we are in our seventies and it's time to retire. Our last issue will be December 2023.


How we hate to see this publication come to an end!

"Oysterponds at Leisure" (Photography) – Culled from our extensive collection, these photographs depict people in East Marion and Orient as they rest, play, and enjoy a respite from the daily grind of work. There are scenes on the water (boating and ice skating), on the beach, relaxing on porches (at hotels and at home), playing (grownups and children), riding in carriages and cars, bicycling, sightseeing, and celebrating special events.

"In Pursuit of Whales" – Concentrates on documents pertaining to whaling during its heyday in the second quarter of the 19th century. Numerous whaling vessels sailed out of the East End of LI and we have a trove of individual items (letters, contracts, legal documents etc.) relating to dozens different whaling vessels which sailed the seven seas.

"William Steeple Davis Block Prints" - Focuses on the print-making of Orient multi-

media luminary Davis (1884-1961)–specifically on his wood-block and linoleumblock prints. He began making block prints in 1924 and sent them to exhibitions around the country. They are some of his best work in any medium, and are being shown together with some of the actual wood and linoleum blocks that he cut to create the prints.

"What is It?" – Our collections are full of extraordinary objects that seem strange to 21st century eyes but, in fact, were common household objects, ordinary implements or useful tools from a century or two ago. Today, it's a challenge to determine how they were used or for what purpose, but–don't worry–we'll supply copious hints to help visitors as they try to deduce what each mysterious item is. Co-curated by Sarah Olmstead.

**"Happy Birthday: Orient Yacht Club at 90"** – The OYC occupies a central place in the Oysterponds universe. Over the past nine decades OYC has transformed hundreds of sailing novices and landlubbers into intrepid seafarers. Photos and documents capture the compelling history and reflect the Club's importance to generations.

"Melita Hofmann: Author, Illustrator, Naturalist" – Ms. Hofmann (1907-1976), curator of OHS from its founding in 1944 until 1963, was responsible for most of the early displays and exhibitions at OHS. She studied both at the Parsons School of Design and NYU, as well as in Paris and Munich. She was the author-illustrator of The Big Book of Birds, Pearls of Ferrara and A Trip to the Pond.






