


BROWNIES IN A SOUTHOLD PARADE



THE WHARF AT FOUNDERS LANDING

Many readers associate Founder's Landing is Southold with the "Wharf House" on the Peconic Bay, a great building owned by the Southold Park District that has been the site for many weddings, private parties and community events. 



THE SOUTHOLD WHARF (NOW FOUNDERS LANDING)

The above postcard of the wharf at Founders Landing is dated 1848. The photo on the facing page, date unknown, would predate the above as it shows the dock's shed. For many years steamships brought in cargo and tourists. The original dock was built during the 19th century by Jonathan Terry who owned a coal and lumber yard at this location.

Sunday, July 2, The 14th Annual HERITAGE DAY, 12 noon to 4pm. Many years ago, local schoolmaster, tavern keeper, store owner, and Oysterponds diarist, Augustus Griffin (1767-1866), began a tradition of the reading of the Declaration of Independence on July 4th. That grew into Heritage Day, an annual celebration where the Oysterponds community (East Marion and Orient) comes together to celebrate. The program will start with a parade down Orient's Village Lane led by the Grand Marshal; followed by a welcome and invocation at the Old Point Schoolhouse; the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance; "God Bless America" sung by Franklin Mastrangelo; and the reading of the Declaration of Independence by Oysterponds stalwarts. The event will continue in nearby Poqutuck Park, with hot dogs, treats, kids' games, and musicby North Fork Favorites, the Mudlfats.

Village House (1555 Village Lane) is period-furnished with noteworthy pieces from the OHS collection and shown as a late 19th-century boarding house, demonstrating a significant chapter in its history. This year's Village House exhibitions are:

"Oysterponds at Leisure" (Photography) - Culled from our extensive collection, these photographs depict people in East Marion and Orient as they rest, play, and enjoy a respite from the daily grind of work. There are scenes on the water (boating and ice skating), on the beach, relaxing on porches (at hotels and at home), playing (grownups and children), riding in carriages and cars, bicycling, sightseeing, and celebrating special events.

"In Pursuit of Whales" – Concentrates on documents pertaining to whaling during its heyday in the second quarter of the 19th century. Numerous whaling vessels sailed out of the East End of LI and we have a trove of individual items (letters, contracts, legal documents etc.) relating to dozens different whaling vessels which sailed the seven seas.

"William Steeple Davis Block Prints" – Focuses on the print-making of Orient multimedia luminary Davis (1884-1961)-specifically on his wood-block and linoleumblock prints. He began making block prints in 1924 and sent them to exhibitions around the country. They are some of his best work in any medium, and are being shown together with some of the actual wood and linoleum blocks that he cut to create the prints.

"What is It?" – Our collections are full of extraordinary objects that seem strange to 21st century eyes but, in fact, were common household objects, ordinary implements or useful tools from a century or two ago. Today, it's a challenge to determine how they were used or for what purpose, but-don't worry-we'll supply copious hints to help visitors as they try to deduce what each mysterious item is Co-curated by Sarah Olmstead.

"Happy Birthday: Orient Yacht Club at 90" - The OYC occupies a central place in the Oysterponds universe. Over the past nine decades OYC has transformed hundreds of sailing novices and landlubbers into intrepid seafarers. Photos and documents capture the compelling history and reflect the Club's importance to generations.

"Melita Hofmann: Author, Illustrator, Naturalist" – Ms. Hofmann (1907-1976), curator of OHS from its founding in 1944 until 1963, was responsible for most of the early displays and exhibitions at OHS. She studied both at the Parsons School of Design and NYU, as well as in Paris and Munich. She was the author-illustrator of The Big Book of Birds, Pearls of Ferrara and A Trip to the Pond.

Saturday July 8: Sinking of the Steamship Lexington, 2pm, Horton Point Lighthouse. Author Bill Bleyer presents the harrowing story of a ship's journey from glory to tragedy. Originally commissioned by Cornelius Vanderbilt, the Steamboat Lexington eventually became the most prestigious steamship on the heavily trafficked Long Island Sound. However, in 1840 a fire broke out. Only four among over 140 on board survived by clinging to bales of cotton. Rain date 2pm, July 9.



During his 37 years on the bench in Suffolk County, Supreme Court Justice Thomas M. Stark, while presiding over more than 250 criminal jury trials, developed a reputation as a tough but fairminded jurist with a deep knowledge of criminal law. In Horrific Homicides, Judge Stark shares the stories of four trials that mesmerized Long Islanders in the 1970s and 1980s, chief among them the shocking murders of the DeFeo family in Amityville. Judge Stark died in 2014, having nearly completed the manuscript for the book. His daughters, Elizabeth Stark Dugan and Ellen Stark, who grew up hearing stories of their father's trials at the dinner table, completed the book based on trial notes, court filings, and news reports. 
