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On Our bover...

The wrath of the 1954 Hurricane Carol, which was a Category 3 storm, caused flooding all over the North Fork from both the Sound and the Bay.

This cover photo, as well as all photos in this issue unless noted, came form an album of Hurricane Carol, source unknown, with photos of Southold and Greenport. We are not sure of the location of the flooded street in this photo. Possibly one of our readers will be able to identify the street.



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Hurricane Carol's high tide from the Long Island Sound at Kenny's Beach reached beyond Soundview Avenue. The wooden structure in the water on the right might possibly be the life guard's stand.

The photo on the right is the same view today.



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Hurricane Carol was among the worst tropical cyclones on record to affect eastern Long Island. It developed from a tropical wave near the Bahamas on August 25, 1954, and slowly strengthened as it moved northwestward, making landfall on Long Island August 31, producing wind gusts of 120 miles per hour (190km/h) on Montauk Point.[3] Winds on the island gust to 120mph (195km/h). The hurricane's storm surge covers the Montauk Highwayin Montauk, effectively isolating eastern Long Island for a period of time.

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The Pinecrest Dunes Camp bulletin below, courtesy of the Southold Free Library Whitaker Historical Collection, tells quite the story about Hurricane Carol..

HOW'RE THINGS?

This is a pre post-season bulletin to inform Pinecresters relative to the Hurricane Harn.

In a few words

" Carol Came To Campilitt"

The last official visiting-day in Pinecrest for 1954 was Sunday, August fifteenth. Either Carol did not know,--- or she did not care. At any rate, Carol came to camp, and if she or her relatives fail to visit again for fifty years, Pinecrest will be quite happy.

Hurricane Carol appeared in Pinecrest early on the morning of Sugust thirty-first; she remained with us two hours; she departed; she returned for another two hours; and now we are surveying the havoc of her hovering humor.

Pinecrest has survived four hurricanes. The first in 1938, which destroyed more than 500 trees. The second in 1944, which turned over all the junior cabins and the infirmary,- piled twelve feet of salt water on the fresh-water lake, and kept the waters of Great Pond salty for four years.

The third hurricane actually was not recognized as such, after all it nerely blew away an aeroplane-hanger(containing two planes), blew the aquatic-department office and cabin from the shore of the lake, destroyed the main storehouse of the camp, - and crippled the power plant for three months.

This fourth one, however, constitutes an actual, honest-to-goodness blow. VERY BRIEFLY, a preliminary report will show the following (the few cases of measles of this past summer -you will hear completely about them in the post-season bulletin-wereNOTHING by comparison):

We listened to the six-oclock news, as is customary in Pinecrest to start the day in possession of the developments of the outside world. Strangely enough, we discovered that the outside world was preparing to come to us.

With Ken Schold, after learning that there MICHT be a visit by Carol, we awakened Undle John Supplee, Walt Frees, McShane-Berger-Louie Clarke, Dave Emerson, and Obadiah, Jr. These hapless creatures were informed that a little time remained to enable us to batten down everything for Carol's visit.

The Krause family, the Zeitler Family, and thepost-season campers(Torres, Rejaunier, Kalkopf, Howell, two von Gronicks, and Marilyn Schmeh) all were nailed tight in their cabins. Nurse Nale, Fran, Mrs. Schmeh, Lois Ward, and Haw Haw were assigned to the dining-hall to keep it from being blown or washed away. Mr. Schmeh assisted Haw Haw in supervising.

The Gravenhorsts, Dave Thompson, and Grace held down the FEEDBAG. The rest of us, with Ken Schold and Tugga, put all the cances in the REC Hall, swamped the rowboats to keep them under water, nailed shut all the cabins, and set about to tie down the red and the silver Sea Bees.

While we were tying cenent blocks to the wings of the Sea Bees; Carol overtook us. The planes rocked, they junped, they twisted, and they nearly took off backwards. At one time, Nike Berger, who was hanging onto one wing of the Silver Bird, was tossed up into the air for about twelve feet. Fortunately the ship and Mike were pulled back to earth by the rest of us. (This was Mike's first solo flight.)

Finally, after succeeding in placing ten cement blocks under each wing of each plane, we were forced to leave the birds to their fate. Power lines had been blown down, the large trees in the wood were being uprooted, and the Sound was a furious sea of fifteen-foot war waves. All this continued until twelve thirty.

Then came that notorious disarning and deceitful peace that accompanies a hurricane for those who are directly in its course. The sun began to shine; no air stirred; the warnth was cheerful. The campers came from their cabins in happy Pre post-season bulletin 2

spirits to survey the real good fortune of survival. However, the ole-timers of the camp, who had survived the preceding hurricanes, knew that this peacefulness was nothing more than the centre of the hurricane, ---- often called the "core". These veterans knew that this was merely a respite before the second blow would strike.

The incredulous newcomers were apprised of the impending return of Carol. Despite their disbelief, they set to the task of bracing for the second, and more-severe, blow ---which shortly came.

Knowing that there was nothing more that could be done, the campers and leaders under the direction of Joe Zeitler, Ken Schold, and John Supplee went to the Sound to assist in the rescue of a motorboat that was being battered to pieces by the surf. After that, they remained to watch the growing intensity of the Sound. The waves rose to heights exceeding fifteen feet, the velocity of the wind grew to a recorded 100 miles per hour, and the awful majestic power of the wind and waves made itself known. A few hardy creatures ventured to the edge of the surf; after they encountered the first wave and were tossed twenty feet up the beach, they decided that they would leave Carol to herself. The experience, nevertheless, was interesting although rugged.

Then came the second part of the blow. The wind began to increase in strength, and within a half hour, a nore-disastrous storn was upon us. This time, the wind was blowing from the West (before it had blown from the East); the Sound rose to the top of the bank,--- and the thing that the veteran Pinecresters feared began to occur. The Sound poured over the bank!

A torrent of salt water began to rush down into camp from the Sound. A river of water and nud and debris (all from Connecticut, of course, since we have no mud in the Long Island portions of the Sound) rushed up the road leading from the Sound into Junior Camp. It quickly flooded the sixth and the fifth Junior cabins; it swirled around the infirmary (Nurse Nale swam out with hor belongings, and the doors were quickly closed to keep the furniture from washing into Great Pond); and millions of gallons of water raged past the flagpole, past the guesthouse, and into the lake. BOWTIE COVE, Fussypuss Pass, Jones Inlet, Smitty's Cance Channel, and all the beautiful construction at the Diving-tower are no longer in existence; all have been washed down to the East end of the Lake.

In the 1944 Hurricane, the salt water rose to a height of 12 feet over the lake and put the highest diving-board under water. This time, the water rose to a point about one foot lower than the highest board,--- about nine feet above the normal level of the lake. The recreation hall was flooded to a point almost above the piano; the tennis court was under water; the golf course became a pool for the ducks and the geese; and Gesundt Heights (where the families live) became an island.

As this bulletin is being composed (Friday, September third), the water has receded until now the guesthouse and the recreation hall are just showing their floors above the water; it is possible to enter the infirmary; and the ducks are quacking protest because they must leave the tennis court and golf course.

Kenny is now busy reconnoitring and planning how best to recover the usefulness of the campus and the lake. During the next two months, he and the directors will be busy rebuilding the lakefront and removing a hundred trees that now clutter the camp roads and activity areas; to say nothing of the chore of picking up several-thousand dead fishes that have been killed by the salt-water invasion. All appearances indicate a somewhat busy winter for the Scholds and the Wards.

In view of all the foregoing, it is remotely possible that the publication of the post-season bulletin might be slightly tardy; however, it will make its appearance to give full facts about the closing of camp, the trouble with the dozen-and-a-half cases of measles(which has been relegated to unimportance now in the face of Carol); reunion plans, et cetera,

At least, now Pinecrest can boast of a fresh-water lake which possesses starfish, crabs, shrinp, and many other specimen of ocean life. So,- until we have time to type again, here's salt in your lake!!!!

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

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

A look at one more hurricane....

The 1944

Great Atlantic Hurricane

(before hurricanes were given names)

...makes landfall on Long Island on September 14th as a category1 hurricane at a high forward speed of 40mph. Wind gusts of well over 100 mph breaks previous wind records in New York City, while a minimum pressure reading of 28.47inches is recorded on Long Island. 117 homes are completely destroyed, while 2,427 are severely damaged and almost 1000 businesses are destroyed or damaged. In all, six people are killed, and one person is injured.

MATTITUCK-LAUREL HISTORICAL SOCIETY 18200 Main Rd. (Rt. 25) & Cardinal Dr. Mattituck

Saturday October 7, Mattituck Presbyterian Church Graveyard Tour As a cooperative effort, the Mattituck-Laurel Historical Society, the Mattituck Presbyterian Church's Graveyard Restoration Committee and the North Fork Community Theatre will host the fourth annual Graveyard Tour. The tour begins at the Theatre at 12700 Old Sound Ave., Mattituck, and goes through the graveyard where actors in period costumes recount the life stories of historical figures who are buried in the graveyard. The tour will end at the Mattituck Presbyterian Church. Six "widow guides" dressed in Victorian mourning costumes will guide attendees from the theatre through the cemetery, recounting the lives of notable figures in Mattituck's history while standing atop their graves. The notables include Revolutionary and Civil War veterans, architects, pastors and lawyers who were responsible for forming Mattituck as we know it today, as well as some of the women who supported them. It will also feature the story of the Wickham murders, the victims of which are buried at the gravesite. Mary Kalich, a member of the board of directors of the theater will start the tour with a brief history of the theater and how it was once a church. The tour ends with a brief talk by the Victorian undertaker on the strange and macabre Victorian mourning customs. Tours start at 2pm and end at 4pm with a maximum of 20 people/group scheduled in 10-minute intervals. Tickets must be purchased in advance. The tour begins at a booth on the North West corner of the Old Burial Ground at 32770 Main Road (corner of Main and Harbor Lane). Actors in period costumes will recount the life stories of historic figures buried there. Six "widow guides" dressed in Victorian mourning costumes will guide you through the burial ground, recounting the lives of notable figures in Cutchogue's history while standing atop their graves. The notables include a veteran of the French-Indian War, an exiled Tory, a beloved school teacher, former slaves and many more who were responsible for forming Cutchogue as we know it today. Mark MacNish, Executive Director of the Council will start the tour off with a brief history of the burial site and hand it over to Mary Kalich, a member of the board of directors of the theatre who will give a brief history of the theater and how it was once a church. 
