

'THEN & NOW: PAINTINGS OF SOUTHOLD' EXHIBITION THRU OCT 11

The Southold Historical Society exhibition of period and contemporary paintings in the Mayne Gallery in the Ann Currie-Bell House, 55200 Main Road, Southold, features historic paintings of the North Fork juxtaposed by contemporary works that depict similar or identical scenes. This comparison highlights the changing landscapes and cityscapes over the decades. In some cases the older paintings span as far back as 100 years, making the differences between them and the modern works even more striking. It is also inspiring having the works of renowned artists of the past side by side with present-day artists.

The historic paintings are by artists who lived all over the North Fork and include notable locals such as Caroline M. Bell of Mattituck; Marguerite Hawkins of Cutchogue; Edwin Prellwitz of Peconic; Thomas Currie-Bell and Joseph B. Hartranft of Southold, and William Steeple Davis of Orient.

Among the contemporary artists who are participating are Diane Alec-Smith, one of more well-known art teachers on the North Fork; Adelaide Amend, who is known for her land and seascapes, including the Old Town Arts & Crafts Guild in Cutchogue; Wendy Prellwitz, scion of the noted Prellwitz family of artists from Peconic; Jada Rowland of Greenport, who is known for her very fine portraits; and Ann McCaughey of Cutchogue, who has recently been involved in the Cloud 9 artists group.

While the older works are part of the permanent collection of the Society and not for sale, the contemporary works will be for sale with 25% of the proceeds benefiting the Historical Society. The exhibit will be on display through October 11, Wednesday, Saturday, and Sunday, 1-4pm. For info call (631) 765-5500 or visit www.southoldhistoricalsociety.org.





JURIED ART EXHIBITION SET FOR AUGUST 22 - SEPTEMBER 5

The Southold Historical Society is hosting an exhibition of paintings/sculpture as part of the second annual "North Fork Annual," a juried art exhibition held in the Society's Reichert Family Center's Cosden-Price Gallery, 54127 Main Road, Southold. The \$500 "Thomas Currie-Bell Memorial Purchase Prize", which will be awarded to the best work in the show, is named in honor of Southold painter Thomas Currie-Bell (1873-1946). He was a native of Scotland who trained extensively in Great Britain then came to America in 1929 and settled in Southold. He traveled up and down the east coast, painting portraits and local scenery. His wife, Ann Hallock Currie-Bell, was the founder of the Southold Historical Society, where a number of his paintings can be viewed.

Artists from all over the east end of Long Island were invited to participate in the exhibition, as long as they either 'resided on' or 'worked on' the North Fork. Entries will be scrutinized by the two jurors; Sean Cleary, Chief Operating Officer of the well-respected Phillips Auction House of New York City; and Sara Evans, freelance art writer and co-author of a book that explores artists of the North Fork from the 18c to 1970. Out of the submissions, only 20 works will be selected to be exhibited, and from those the prizewinner will be selected. The winning piece will join the permanent collection of the historical society. The winner will be announced at the opening reception for the exhibition on Friday, August 21, 5:30 to 7pm. All of the remaining artworks selected for the exhibition will be available for sale at that time and for the duration of the exhibition. The exhibit will be open Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, 1-4pm. For more information call (631) 765-5500.

THE SUFFOLK COUNTY FAIR

took place for nearly a hundred years, from the 1840s thru most of the 1930s, and was organized by the Suffolk County Agricultural Society. The Society's Fair Grounds at Riverhead, today owned by the Riverhead Central School District, was the site of many Suffolk County Fairs and numerous other popular events in Suffolk County's history. Babe Ruth once played a baseball game here, and Teddy Roosevelt campaigned for New York State governor. The following extracts and documents from Annual Reports of the Suffolk County Agricultural Society within our library collection as well as from the Brooklyn Eagle give us a glimpse into the amazing history of the Riverhead Fair Grounds.

From "The County Fair 1869 Annual Report):

On approaching the Fair Grounds, one's eye would behold what was truly a countyfair enclosure, with all the modern improvements. The grounds are conveniently situated but a short distance north of the railroad depot--as level a spot as could be well obtained--and contains a little more than 20 acres, being a donation to the Society by the people of Riverhead. It is enclosed by a high board-fence, at the southeast corner of which is the entrance, President's office, etc. At the west side of the lot are the stalls for the horses and cattle, and the coops for poultry; the north side is devoted to a half-mile race course, while the south and east sides are used for the exhibition of carriages, agricultural implements, hucksters' tents, etc. In the center of the race course there is a level spot devoted to the players of baseball, and at the west side of the track there are two large stands, capable of seating upward of a thousand people, erected for the accommodation of those who wish to witness the trial of horse speed.... A large number of people passed over the Long Island Railroad to attend the exhibition, and a vast number came by other means, and it is estimated by competent judges that on Thursday afternoon from six to seven thousand persons were at one time present....










RULES, REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS (1877 Annual Report) The following are the terms of admission to the Fair Grounds: Single ticket entrance: 25 cents Carriage with two horses, per day: \$1.00 Carriage with one horse, per day: 50 cents Each person in carriage: 25 cents Hitching posts will be provided free of charge. All horses above described, while on the grounds, unless hitched to the hitching posts, must remain in charge of the driver. All persons are forbid tying to a tree, under fine of one dollar. Only private vehiles will be admitted to the Fair Grounds.

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR PRESIDENT McKINLEY (Brooklyn Eagle, 1901): As reported in the Brooklyn Eagle on September 19, 1901, over six thousand people from Suffolk County were in attendance at the Riverhead Fair Grounds for a memorial service for President McKinley, who had been assassinated four days earlier. "The services began shortly after 1 o'clock with appropriate selections by the Shelter Island Band" and a touching prayer by Rev. Joseph Fisher of the Riverhead M.E. Church. The "immense audience joined in singing 'America' with a spirit and fervor worthy of the occasion."

AT RIVERHEAD FAIR GROUNDS.

The Dead President's Favorite Hymns Sung by an Audience of Six Thousand Patriotic Long Islanders.

(Special to the Eagle.)

Riverhead, L. I., September 19-The patriotism of the people of Suffolk County and the perfect weather brought a throng of about 6,000 persons to the fair grounds this afternoon to participate in memorial services in honor of the memory of the martyred Presi-The services began shortly after 1 c'clock with appropriate selections by the Shelter Island Band, following which the Rev. Joseph A. Fisher of the Riverhead M. E. Church, offered a touching prayer. the immense audience joined in singing "America" with a spirit and fervor worthy of the occason

Then ex-Congressman Henry A. Reeves, the president of the society, arose and spoke substantially as follows:

"This assemblage upon the fair grounds of the Agricultural Society for an hour of devotional, religious and patriotic observance, in recognition of a universal sorrow and in humble supplication to Almighty God for His guidance and support under one of the direct afflictions that ever befell any people is an unparalleled event, even as the occasion which calls us together is, in some of its aspects, an unequaled one. Your officers, on the eve of opening our annual fair of 1901, in common with the whole American people and with all the civilized ruces of mankind, were over-whelmed with grief at the death of a President than whom none in his long line of illustrious predecessors better deserved, by reason of personal attributes and graces of character, to be known as 'The Well Beloved.






