

y childhood's first venture in the salt water was holding hands and jumping up and down. When we dared to take our feet off the bottom we learned to "Dog Paddle" with chin held high and usually with inflated canvas "Water Wings" to hold us up. Finally we put our heads down in the water and learned the Side Stroke.

Annette Kellerman, a spectacular exhibition swimmer from Australia, emancipated women from those heavy, full skirts and bloomers when she popularized the One Piece bathing suit about 1910. I remember seeing her exciting performance of High Diving in the great tank at the New York Hippodrome in New York.

Nowadays, it seems to me, with all the light-weight floating aids, that my great-grandchildren's generation just get thrown into the water and they swim!



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#### THE OLD MILL


Editor's Note: The "Old Mill" in Rose Newell's story stood at the end of Mill Lane in Peconic at the mouth of what is known today as Goldsmith's Inlet.

Grandpa and I often drove up to the Old Mill at the Sound, a place that lingers in fond memory. I find that people who never saw it have heard of it and are interested, so I'll tell again its story.

It was built in 1841 on the west bank of the Gutter. The "Gutter" is the channel which runs straight from Long Island Sound to the round body of the Inlet some distance south. At about the halfway point stood the grist mill with a footbridge across to the east bank, bulkheaded at the sides. The first picture is the mill in its prime, photographed in 1891. The great windwheel had been added some years after the original building was erected because the waterwheel depended on the tide, and at harvest time when the farmers brought their grain to be ground there were wasted hours. With the wind wheel functioning, the millstones could be operated between tides.

I have been asked how the waterwheel worked. When you examine the picture closely you can see that the rising tide flowing in from the Sound floated up the tide gates which hung on the inner side of the bridge. When the tide turned and ebbed out into the Sound the gates went down and were pinned against the uprights of the bridge, thus making a barrier that diverted the head of water into a narrow sluiceway on the west side. The water went roaring and tumbling out under the wheel, rotating it rapidly. This in turn moved all the bars and cogs of the simple machinery inside the mill and spun the grindstones which crushed the wheat into flour.

In the days before power boats were prevalent, sailing sloops and schoo-

ners were the means of water transportation on Long Island Sound. Although the east-west channel for big boats is on the Connecticut side, violent northerly storms in winter often drove boats across to Long Island beaches, especially from Cutchogue to Southold, and I remember a number of wrecks.

The Northeast gale and blizzard of Thanksgiving time in 1898 wrecked the windwheel of the mill and blew the freighter MACAULEY ashore at the mouth of the Inlet. She was salvaged but it took almost two years to dig her out and float her off.

The windwheel was never restored but the power of the waterwheel was used for a few more years. Soon after 1900, however, the rapid development of the Machine Age – gasoline motors for instance, made this local water power unnecessary, and the mill fell into disuse and became the victim of other storms and the destructive hand of Man. The great beams were taken for lumber, the shingles for firewood, and I knew of one man who carted off one of the big round millstones and sold it to a wealthy Southampton resident for a step in his formal garden. For a good price, too! It makes me think of George Corwin who said, "I know this is a FREE COUNTRY, but some people seem to think everything in it is free, even if it's nailed down."

The other millstone, much later, was dug out of the sand by John Sepenoski and recently his son, John, gave it to the Southold Historical Society for which we are very grateful. It is the front step of the Moore House on the Society grounds.

Easterly storms drive sand to the West, and sometimes the mouth of the Inlet was blocked. Then gangs of men from the village shovelled it out. Now there is a stone jetty which is supposed to keep it open, but it has ruined the beach to the East. For years the Gutter was bulkheaded by big cribs of logs and heavy timbers filled with rocks, and the tide scoured out the bed of the channel, making it deep enough for small sloops and dories to go in and tie up at the mill.

Every spring the beach was strewn with driftwood from the winter storms providing fuel for the Saturday night picnic fires that were a regular feature of the summertime.

The pictures show the Gutter iced over and the beach to the east littered with driftwood.

The tide run at its peak in either direction was terribly strong. On the incoming tide a good swimmer could dive off the logs into the fast-running stream and ride it in to shallow, quiet water and that was fun, but it was very dangerous to take it going out. We local people respected this. To illustrate the force of the current I tell this tragic incident.

One summer afternoon in the Twenties, I went up to the Sound for a swim and noticed that there were more people around than usual, not lying on the beach or in swimming but standing in small groups. Then I saw with great shock the body of a tall man in a gray bathing suit laid like a stiff plank across some fish boxes. A stranger to the area, he had waded along the very brink of the channel, the sand caved in under his feet and he was plunged into the tide run and sucked into a powerful eddy. He surfaced some distance east as the falling tide turns in that direction.

Someone had driven back to the village to call the doctor and bring men to help, but by the time the men got him out of the water rigor mortis had set in and they needed the coroner.



But radio and gravity waves can be detected, helping us unravel the mysteries of space and time. Only recently, have these predictions made by Einstein been proven to be true. 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


