



Reader Feedback!

In our last issue we asked if anyone could provide more info on the 1952 photo (shown below) of Barth's Hotel. We assumed it was on Front Street because the window reflection shows the sign for Mitchell's Restaurant. We thank Carlos DeJesus of Greenport for the following:

"The Barth Hotel was owned by Mr. Frederick E. Barth. It was located just west of where the Colonial Drug Store now stands. The Fred E. Barth that owned the Barth Hotel in 1912 died in 1931, but the hotel continued until 1958/9. Not sure which Barth continued running it.

"In the facing parade photo, Barth's Hotel is the building west or in photo left of Sterling Market. There's a sign next to that you can partially read Liquor; Irving Barth owned it.

Suddenly, art was available to all from such printers as Louis Prang and Currier & Ives. The Kreutz brothers came to the US as fifth-generation glass-blowers, settling in Suffolk County and establishing their glassworks company on Flanders Road in Riverhead. The Kreutz brothers used the traditional centuries-old hand-blown glass techniques they had learned in their homeland.
