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
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MISS RHEINGOLD, LORETTA RISSELL, IN A SOUTHOLD PARADE, 1963

After a 1963 summer parade in Southold, the start of a week long "Block Party" begins behind the fire house — something both kids and adults looked forward to. Here we see Chief Adolph Westerlund posing alongside Miss Rheingold, Loretta Rissell. There is no doubt the loquacious peanut gallery in the rear spared little comment.

Faces we recognize in the group are Mr. George Gaffga (a member for 77 years!), Billy Parks, Dick Winters, Charlie Turner, Joe Akscin, George Conway, Jerome Conway, June Albertson, Ben Drumm, Bill Salmon and Joe Milovich. Apologies to those not identified.

Many Southolders have fond memories of these block parties. If any readers have any block party photos to share we would love to print them. Besides the great ferris wheel, spinning cups and kiddie rides, there were booths and booths of spinning gambling wheels and games like tossing the rings on the bottles or hitting the target with a ball or gun. The prizes back then were not trinkets; instead they were items donated by local businesses including appliances, sets of glasses, games, baskets of goodies... and of course the big stuffed animals.

The first Miss Rheingold contest was held in 1940. Every year after, the election of a new Miss Rheingold was an exciting, anticipated event. After selection of six young women finalist, their pictures were displayed everywhere Rheingold beer was sold: Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. The voting would take place over the following 6 weeks.

Beer sales were not only in bars but in delis and grocery stores. The photos of the finalists were on display on a voting box where the beer was sold, and everyone could vote and you could vote as many times as you wanted. So many votes were cast that the bags of ballots were weighed instead of counted.

Miss Rissell won the second to last year the contest was held.



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So Long, Old Schoolhouse Days

This story, reprinted from the Peconic Bay Shopper archives, was written many years ago by Howard Terry. Mr. Terry attended the Bay View School in the years just before it closed in 1925. He, along with other Bay View pupils, then went to the larger one-room school that opened the following year about a quarter of a mile away. After only a couple of years, the second schoolhouse also closed its doors and the Bay View children were bussed into Southold village when the two school districts were consolidated. The Old Bay View Schoolhouse was moved from its original location to become part of the Southold Historical Society's Museum Complex. Mr. Terry was the most dedicated of the volunteers who worked tirelessly on its restoration.

his morning I thought I faintly heard the chime of our old school-house bell; it must have been the morning breeze. I'm sorry, kids, there'll be no school today in our little old schoolhouse — and probably never will be again.

There'll be no more school meetings in the evening by candlelight, when

our parents and teachers decided what was best for us. The district superintendant won't be stopping by to tell us a story and hear us recite from the lessons we were to learn: He would ask someone to do the multiplication table, someone to add, subtract, divide, someone to recite a verse or read a poem, a few more questions and then we'd all stand and give the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag standing proudly in the corner of the classroom, and we'd try to do our best as we sang a verse of "America." Then he'd be gone, off to the next little schoolhouse on his route.

No, kids, there'll be no school today in our proud little schoolhouse — and

probably never will be again. Seems like only yesterday that some Scrooge of an efficiency expert ordered our school traded in for a big yellow bus.

We have to get up much earlier to do our chores and such, gobble our breakfast, round up our schoolwork and be at the end of the driveway, ready to board that big yellow bus. If by chance we are a little bit late, the driver will blow the horn — but only once!

Then we are off to that big central school miles and miles away, with its

cold brick and stonework and its unfriendly ways. When we get there, we are the targets of all sorts of insults, jeers and scorn from the "city kids" already there: "Did you see those hicks who came in today on bus 25?"

We try to talk to the teachers but it seems they are busy planning a big party for the PTA. We try to talk to the principal but he won't see


> us. He walks off and leaves us. We fumble and bumble our way through that long day and at last get back home on that big yellow bus.

We are tired, disillusioned, thoroughly down and sick at heart, with tears running down our face. Mother gives us a hug and says, "Remember the animals, your friends, they always come first." We start with Tom, the turkey, who is to be Thanksgiving dinner for our family, relatives and friends. Tom is a grand old bird. He stands over four feet tall, with beautiful plumage that he proudly displays to one and all. He

gives us a terrible tongue-

lashing in words he un-

derstands, but we get the

message as only the guilty can. The chickens are fed, the eggs gathered, the pigs that are to be our hams, bacon, pork chops and sausage for the long winter months give us the evil eye and a greeting of loud, squealing grunts, which we interpret to mean, "Hey, where have you been?" The geese for Christmas dinner give us a haughty stare and then turn on us with loud honking and hissing. We know it means, "You used to feed us in daylight and here it is nearly dark!"

Finally, the pens are clean, the animals are watered and fed, the wood-

box by the kitchen stove is filled. We don't have time to work in the garden. This is mother's pride and joy. What we don't need right away, she cans or pickles or preserves. She keeps the jams and jellies in the cool root cellar with the potatoes, onions, turnips, cabbage and such for the long winter months ahead. The garden chores will have to wait for Saturday.

Now the chores are done and Mother puts dinner on the table and

Father says Grace. After dinner we feel somewhat better, but there is still work to be done. The eggs have to be cleaned and put in cartons so the milk-truck driver can drop them at the wholesaler's on his morning rounds. (The return from the eggs helps to pay for our schoolbooks and winter hats and gloves.) Then there is schoolwork to do before Mother hears our prayers and tucks us in bed.







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Before we know it, it is daylight and Mother is calling us to

start another horrible day at the big central schoolhouse so many miles away.

On Saturday, if it's a nice day and all our work is done, sometimes we are allowed to go over to the creek, where we keep an old rowboat. We often get a mess of scallops, or meadowlark oysters, or even some blue crabs — oh, how they bite! These are always a welcome addition to our table. Occasionally, if there is no moon or breeze and the tide is right, Father takes us "firelighting" with a big lamp and reflector enclosed in a big glass cage fastened to the back of the boat. He nets blue crabs, spears some eels, scoops up some scallops. We often see a muskrat scurry for its hole in the muddy bank as we paddle along the grassy and weedy shoreline. Sometimes we hear the barking of a fox, or a raccoon chomping on a mussel, or a possum looking for a meal.

The eel skins are hung on the corncrib to dry. They make excellent leather thongs to tie the head to the handle of a flail. When the time is right, a big canvas is spread on the barn floor, delicate grains such as barley, and dry beans from the garden (for baking), cabbage seed and Brussels sprout seed are thrashed by hand with the flail. The grains, beans and seeds are winnowed by pouring the lot from one tub to another while the breeze blows the chaff away.





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




GRAVEYARD TOUR SATURDAY OCTOBER 24

The Mattituck-Laurel Historical Society, the Mattituck Presbyterian Church's Graveyard Restoration Committee and the North Fork Community Theatre together host this Historical Graveyard Tour. The tour begins at the NFCT at 12700 Old Sound Ave, Mattituck, and goes through the graveyard where actors in period costume recount the life stories of historic figures who are buried there, ending at the Mattituck Presbyterian Church. Six "widow guides" dressed in Victorian mourning costumes will guide attendees through the cemetery where costumed actors will recount the lives of notable figures in Mattituck's history, including revolutionary and civil war veterans, architects, pastors and lawyers. 


