from escaping the Adriatic, but it had little or no effect on the submarines based at Cattaro. At the time, Walter was serving under Charles P. "Jugge" Nelson who was appointed commander of the *Leonidas*, a tender of the submarine chaser divisions, and who assumed command of the submarine chaser divisions ordered to Corfu.

Walter married Marion Lane Terry, November 11, 1919, at Riverhead and set up housekeeping there. Marion's father, Everett Oliver Terry, was a blacksmith. When Marion was thirteen, her father died three years after he lost his legs in a train accident. Walter sold machines and automobiles and later was an automotive stock clerk. He and Marion moved to Farmingdale about the time World War II started, and Walter took work as a stock clerk with Grumman. Walter and Marion retired to Lakeland, Florida. Walter died in March 1957. He and his wife are buried in Oak Hill Burial Park in Lakeland. Their only child, Jacqueline T., married Donald H. Swandowski and married a second time to Roderick D. Thompson.

Lizzie Helfrich (Age 5)

Elizabeth May Helfrich was born January 6, 1892 at Mattituck in Southold, the daughter of John C. Helfrich and Annie Frances Stewart. Her father was a house carpenter who built his own hose at Mattituck about 1890 on Love Lane "just west of the Eureka House" (Eureka House is the present day "Iron Skillet" house). Lizzie graduated from Southampton High School, Class of 1910, with her former Mattituck Public School classmate, Florence Fanning. Before she married Carroll Charles Finkenor (born Finkenauer), Lizzie was a school teacher. Lizzie died at age forty-five after being married for only ten years. She had one child: Robert Carroll who married Anna M. Stevenson.




