The Mattituck Public School, September 1897 – June 1898



"Gilt-Edge Butter" and Marratooka Ice

On August 19th, 1891, Anna Wickham smiled at Marguerite, her two-month old, asleep in the swing bassinet. Now she could keep an eye on Wessel, her four-year-old son, and at the same time, help her husband, Charles Wentworth Wickham, prepare for the conference of the New York Dairymen's Association being held on their Marratooka farm, the first session to convene at 10 a.m. At the time, Wickham's creamery was the only one of its kind on Long Island, and his butter was renowned throughout the state. There were to be butter churning demonstrations and lectures by experts from places as far away as Richland and Waterville. Upon the front lawn were spread sumptuous home-prepared dishes brought by the farmers and their families in attendance; Mattituck's Cornet Band would be providing the entertainment.

Charles Wentworth Wickham's rise to prominence in the dairy industry had begun in 1876 when he had established the Marratooka Farm and Dairy on 200 acres that extended from Marratooka Lake to the Great Peconic Bay. The farm contained an impressive herd of Jersey cows, Chester shoats, twenty Southdown ewes, seven horses, and 300 chickens. Large drifts of sea-weed enriched her soil. Wickham also established a creamery on his farm, hiring a professional butter maker from Wisconsin to help create a fine product.





Charles W. Wickham

C. W. Wickham, descended from an aristocratic family that traced its ancestry back to the Wyckhams of Wyckham Abbey, England, was a graduate of Cornell University. His scientific knowledge and skill enabled him to establish a productive modern farm. The creamery, with a state-of-the-art steam engine, had a capacity of 500 pounds of butter a day. Neatly arranged in tasteful white wood packages labeled From the Marratooka Farm, Wickham's renowned "Gilt-Edge Butter" was shipped to some of the finest hotels in New York City on the railroad in ice from his ice house.

In 1878, Wickham built a large ice house on Marratooka Lake to replace a smaller ice house. This large ice house with its wooden shaft to lift blocks of ice onto tiered floors is the ice house we see in vintage photographs.

The lake, originally known as "Dekon Reves's Pond" during the Revolutionary War era, became known as Mattituck Lake. Mr. Wickham later christened the lake with the euphonious name of "Marratooka," at first a variation of Mattituck written as Marritook, and then to its present form.

Wessel and Marguerite, their older sister, Marie Clarissa, and their younger siblings, Cedric Hull and Spencer, grew up on their parents' renowned farm

among prized livestock and alongside the machinery and dedicated workers that made the creamery and ice house run efficiently through the seasons. At ten and six years old respectively, Wessel and Marguerite attended the Mattituck School, in 1897, among the fifty-four students in Miss Mayme Tanner's Primary class. Let us look at the lives of Wessel and Marguerite as well as the other seven children listed at the end of the alphabet in that classroom.



Edith Tuthill (Age 7)

Edith May Tuthill was born February 4, 1890 at Mattituck, the daughter of George Bryden Tuthill, a farmer, and Carrie Maria Case. Edith, who completed eighth grade, eventually married Frederick C. Leicht, a farmer and the son of German immigrants. Fred died July 8, 1954 and is buried at the Old Burying Ground of the 1st Presbyterian Church of Southold. Edith died May 12, 1966, and is buried with Fred.






Willis A. Tuthill's impressive home (above) on the southeast side of Bay Avenue and Peconic Bay Blvd., with its large expanse of lawn that ran down to the bay shore, was an ideal rest for summer boarders. From 1906, he and his wife Laura had conducted their home as a cottage for summer boarders known as "Bay View Cottage." Willis was continuing the tradition of hosting that was begun by his father, Captain Benjamin Gilson Tuthill, who had called his home for summer boarders "Fairyland Cottage."



Flora Tuthill (Age 11)

Flora May Tuthill was born August 8, 1886 at North Mattituck, the daughter of Willis Anderson Tuthill and Laura Elmore Robinson of Mattituck. Her father was a farmer, painter, poultry farmer, bayman, and a boarding house proprietor. Willis also had "the distinction of being the pioneer farmer in Suffolk County to engage in the raising of cauliflower for the New York market, and by his enterprise in this direction he opened new avenues of productive labor to the owners of small farms" (Portrait and Biographical Record). Flora married Percival Aloysius McGuire, February 22, 1908 at Southold. Percival's father, Bernard McGuire, was a Drummer Boy in New York's Fighting Irish Regiment, the 69th Volunteer Infantry, in the War of the Rebellion (the Civil War), and served as commander of the Grand Army of the Republic in the 1900's, a veterans group organized to assist veterans mainly with pensions.

Percival was a stock broker and an advertising manager at various times. Flora and her family lived in Amityville, New York. After Flora's youngest son, Willis, died in action in Germany near the end of World War II, access to any published information about the family becomes opaque. Percival dies January 20, 1959 and is reportedly buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in Bronx, New York. Flora died in May of 1972, probably at Amityville, Babylon; burial details unknown.

Jennie Tuthill (Age 9)

Jennie Louisa Tuthill was born August 17, 1888 at Southold, the daughter of Sidney Preston Tuthill and Mary Jane Boutcher. Her father Sidney founded a seed and produce business that also sold farm equipment; he also served as postmaster and functioned as the town undertaker. Sidney died at age forty-eight when Jennie was about ten years old.

Jennie married Louis Cleaves Young, a carpenter, on January 20, 1910. They had a daughter, Beatrice Louise. Jennie died December 25, 1952, and Louis passed away October 3, 1961; both are buried in New Bethany Cemetery.

Louis Walters (Age 11)

Louis Anthony Walters was born April 7, 1886, the son of George Walters and Bertha Stelzer. His father was a farmer, and Louis completed eighth grade before the family moved to the Islip area. Louis married Mary A. Conlon, an Irish immigrant, who had been born in County Mayo. Louis owned and operated a trucking company in Brookhaven. He was a member of the North Patchogue Fire Department and served as Fire Commissioner for twenty-five years. Louis died in 1971 and his wife Mary in 1978; both are buried in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery in Coram, New York.

Charles Wickham, our creamery man, has had shipped him this week from Canada a special train of thirteen cars containing ice, which it is marvelous for its thickness and purity. (The ice was probably from Lake Champlain.) Some of the cakes weigh nearly a thousand pounds. It is expected that the train will get here by Friday. Mr. Wickham spares no pains or expense to make his creamery butter unexcelled, and this beautiful ice will be a great aid to him this summer as he was unable to secure any ice here of sufficient purity and thickness. The Wickham Siblings

Wessell Raynor Wickham and Helen Marguerite Wickham were the second and third children of Charles Wentworth Wickham and Annie Summers Raynor. Their father operated the very successful Marratooka Farm in Mattituck.

Raynor Wickham (Age 10)

Wessell Raynor Wickham was born August 24, 1887 at Mattituck in Southold. He left school about the age of twelve and tried his hand at farming. He married Arlien Edna Appleby in 1911. Raynor switched to auto repair and opened his own shop. When the war was over, Raynor joined the Navy and earned the rank

of Chief Machinist's Mate in a little over a year of service. He had no overseas experience, but trained in Pensacola, while his wife operated the auto repair business back home.

Arlien died from the 1919 influenza while Raynor was in the service, and while he returned to the auto repair business for a time, he was soon working on yachts. He became known as Captain Wickham and operated the seventy-foot diesel powered Alma for many years. His business was charter fishing, excursions, and pleasure trips, including his own. His boats also included the Windygo, Windigo II, and Sea Goin' II.

Arlien and Raynor had one child, a son Beverly, who died tragically at age eight. In 1922, Raynor married Emily B. Cleveland, a nurse at Kings County Hospital; they divorced in 1929.

In July of 1929, Raynor married a teacher from Mattituck High School, Olive Fortner Catterall. Olive was a graduate of Smith College with a BA and MA, and she taught at Mattituck High School for the 1924 through 1926 terms. For their honeymoon, they left on a yachting trip up the Hudson to Lake Champlain to the St. Lawrence River; through the Great Lakes to Chicago; through the water ways to the Mississippi; down to the Gulf of Mexico, to Cuba then to Key West, and ending in Palm Beach.

Raynor, who died in 1966, and Olive in 1971, are buried in Old Bethany. They had two daughters, Margaret Anne and Joan.

Marguerite Wickham (Age 6)

Helen Marguerite Wickham was born June 2, 1891, very probably at home in Mattituck. Marguerite took the Grand Tour of Europe with her mother and her sister Mary Claire in 1908 and again, with her mother, in 1912. The 1940 census reports her highest school grade to have been only eighth grade; however, she became a registered nurse, graduating from Nassau Hospital School Training for Nurses at Mineola in 1913. Like Mabel Husing and other young ladies, she thought that a career in nursing required vocational training apart from higher education.

Maguerite married George Elliot Goldsmith, August 11, 1917, at Mattituck. Her husband was a Construction Engineer with the Rail Road and later with Allen N. Spooner & Son, builder of major shipping wharves and docking. They lived in Floral Park for thirty-five years, spending summers in Mattituck.

Marguerite and Elliot retired to Mattituck in 1955, where Elliot died two years later. Marguerite joined the Friends of Mattituck Library and the Mattituck Historical Society. She died in 1974 and is buried in Cutchogue Cemetery. They had two daughters, Sheila Anne and Phoebe Eileen.

The Thomas Zenzius Children

Rudolph and Lulu were the two eldest children of Thomas H. Zenzius and Hattie O. Pease. The parents married December 31, 1887 at Eastport, had a son Rudolph at Cutchogue, then moved to Brooklyn for a couple years, where Lulu was born. The family moved back to Mattituck before their daughter Alice was born in late 1895. Thomas was a forman in 1892 at Brooklyn, a farm laborer in 1900 at Mattituck, then became Captain Thomas in 1907, escalloping successfully at Mattituck. Something dire soon happens, and the parents separate for good in 1910. After that, Thomas appears to have menial jobs at hospitals. Hattie became a practical nurse in general practice by 1915. She was living with her son Frank at the time; her youngest son, Arthur, would die in 1918.

Lulu Zenzius (Age 5)

Lulu May Zenzius, also known as Louise May, was born June 1, 1892 at Brooklyn, Kings County, New York. In 1910, Lulu was a servant at the home of George and Lucy Hildreth at Riverhead. She married Arthur Savalian Lee in 1910. It's not clear what happened to this marriage, but the couple would separate and marry others.

About 1819, Lulu married Phillip Blass who would eventually manage a dairy operation. They had one child, Ronald Theodore. The last record we have of Lulu is that, after visiting her son Ronald and his wife in Chatham, New York, December of 1964, she left Albany Airport on a flight to summer in Florida. Oddly, no obituary could be found for Lulu and Phillip.

Rudolph Zenzius (Age 8)

Thomas Rudolph Zenzius was born April 14, 1889 at Southold, and he went on to complete eighth grade. He married Florence Tuthill in 1916. He enlisted in the US Coast Guard, and as his father-in-law had done about fifteen years earlier, Thomas served as a US Coast Guard Surfman. Serving a total of six and a half months

at Coast Guard Station No. 70 at Bridgehampton, Rudolph qualified to operate surf boats in heavy surf in order to rescue shipwrecked mariners and passengers. Rudolph was a carpenter and cabinet maker and owned his own shop in Freeport by 1925. Thomas died in 1968; his wife Florence in 1973. They are buried at the Eastport Cemetery.

Mary "May" Zenzius (Age 6)

Mary Elizabeth Zenzius was born November 27, 1890 at Mattituck, the daughter of John Peter Zenzius and Theresa Whitney, and first cousin of Lulu and Rudolph Zenzius. Her father operated a Livery, and he was a horse dealer. Starting in January, 1901, he con-

ducted the Glenwood Hotel, an establishment whose ample accommodations attracted a select patronage of summer boarders from Brooklyn and New York City. According to the Long Island Traveler (Southold), February 26, 1897, the year Mary attended Miss Mayme Tanner's primary class, John H. Zenzius had a trotter (a horse bred for harness racing) delivered by train for Miss Dolly Bell.

May would have been less that ten years old when her mother Theresa was admitted to the Hudson River State Hospital at Poughkeepsie. May's mother would not return to Mattituck until shortly before 1925, when she would take-up with her unmarried sister, Mary Whitney, and her daughter Bessie on Love Lane.

Mary started attending the Mattituck School in 1896, but by June, 1900, she had moved in with her uncle Thomas Zenzius's family, and her sister Bessie had moved to Riverhead, where she lived with her Whitney grandmother and her aunt, Mary Whitney. The

family reassembled at Mattituck before 1910, and until after her father sold the Glenwood in 1915.

Mary, also known as May, found her way to New Rochelle, Westchester County, New York, where she married Joseph John Traynor, April 17, 1927 at Larchmont. Joseph was the son of Italian immigrants, John Traino and Angelina Tesoriera. Joseph's father was a grocer in the Bronx and later at Westchester. Joseph worked as a butcher and clerk. May and Joseph resided in Westchester County, New York, later at Danbury, Connecticut. May died at Danbury, April 17, 1949, and is buried at the New Rochelle Cemetery. Joseph died December 24, 1974 at Danbury.







This installment ends our review of the lives of the students in Miss Mayme Tanner's Primary Class of 1897-1898.

Miss Tanner had fifty-four students in her charge, the youngest was age two and the oldest age twelve. There were sixteen pairs of siblings, so in some cases, the older sibling might be able to help his or her younger brother or sister. The average age in the class was seven years old. We can surmise that being a primary school teacher at the turn of the century was a challenge. Despite the overwhelming number of students on her class list, we hope Miss Tanner was able to convey some basic knowledge to her pupils, some laughter and some moments of joy.
